### SUPERINTENDENT'S LETTER

I am delighted to welcome you to the 2017-2018 school year! Last school year was a successful year for Lincoln Consolidated Schools; we eliminated the Deficit Elimination Plan, removed the High School from the Priority School list, erased Bishop Elementary from Focus School Status, and most importantly raised student academic performance as indicated on our NWEA tests. On behalf of the staff, we are waiting with excitement to greet students back to school on September 5th for the first day of school.

New in 2017-2018 the Bishop, Brick, and Childs Elementary Schools students will receive Spanish as an elective. The district has implemented a new sixth through twelveth grade math curriculum and Kindergarten through fifth grade will receive new English Language Arts materials. In addition to reviewing the Kindergarten through fifth grade math curriculum implemented last school year, the staff will now begin focusing on Kindergarten through twelfth grade science curriculm.

Doubled up with friends or relatives because you cannot find or afford housing you need to

know that preschool-aged and school-aged children have certain rights or protections under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Assistance Act.

You have the right to:

- Go to school, no matter where you live or how long you have lived there. You must be given access to the same public education provided to other students.
- Continue in the school you attended before you became homeless or the school you last attended, if that is your choice and is feasible.
- Receive transportation to the school you attended before you became homeless or the school you last attended, if you request such transportation.
- Enroll in school without giving a permanent address. Schools cannot require proof of residency that might prevent or delay school enrollment.
- Enroll and attend classes while the school arranges for the transfer of school and immunization records or any other documents required for enrollment.
- Enroll and attend classes in the school of your choice even while the school and you seek to resolve a dispute over enrollment.
- Receive the same special programs and services, if needed, as provided to all other students served in these programs.
- Receive transportation to school and to school programs.

When you move, you should do the following:

- Contact the school district's local liaison for homeless education at 734-484-7054 for help in enrolling your child in a new school or arranging for your child to continue in his or her former school. (Or, someone at a shelter, social services office, or the school can direct you to the person you need to contact.)
- Contact the school and provide any information you think will assist the teachers in helping your child adjust to new circumstances.
- Ask the local liaison for homeless education, the shelter provider, or a social worker for assistance with clothing and supplies, if needed.

### A Parent's Guide For Communicating With Your Child's School

### **BOARD POLICY 9130: PUBLIC COMPLAINTS**

(See full Board Policy at www.lincolnk12. org)

Any person or group, having a legitimate interest in the operations of this District shall have the right to present a request, suggestion, or complaint concerning District personnel, the program, or the operations of the District. At the same time, the Board of Education has a duty to protect its staff from unnecessary harassment. It is the intent of this policy to provide the means for judging each public complaint in a fair and impartial manner and to seek a remedy where appropriate.

It is the desire of the Board to rectify any misunderstandings between the public and the District by direct discussions of an informal type among the interested parties. It is only when such informal meetings fail to resolve the differences, shall more formal procedures be employed.

Any requests, suggestions, or complaints reaching the Board, Board members, and the administration shall be referred to the Superintendent for consideration.

### Listen and Define the Concern

- What is the problem or concern?

- Each person suggests at least one solution to the problem.
- All parties evaluate each possible solution:
  - Can all parties agree with the solution?
  - Is everyone committed to working on the suggested solution?
  - Will the solution work now and in the future?
  - Is everyone willing to share equal responsibility for making the solution work?
  - Does the solution tell who, when and how?

### **FREE & REDUCED LUNCH**

### FOR QUICKER SERVICE, APPLICATIONS CAN BE COMPLETED ONLINE!

Free and reduced-price meals are available to qualified families. Eligibility is based on family income and size. If you think you may qualify, please fill out <u>one application per family</u> and return to any school office, or mail to Lincoln Consolidated Schools, 8970 Whittaker Road, Ypsilanti, MI 48197. Applications are also available on our website at www.lincolnK12.org. Applications will be accepted at any school building, but please mark <u>Food</u> <u>Service</u> on the envelope to ensure prompt delivery.

If you attended Lincoln Schools and received free or reduced-price benefits last year, you will begin the new school year on the same status. However, a new application must be submitted and processed by October 16, 2017 in order for meal benefits to continue for the 2016-2017 school year. If you received benefits at another school district, you will not be eligible for free or reduced meals at Lincoln Schools until an application has been processed and approved. You may apply for free and reduced-priced meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a later change such as a decrease in household income or an increase in household size, you may complete an application at that time.

### New applications must be completed every school year. You are responsible to purchase meals or send a lunch until your application is approved.

### WHAT IS A REGULAR LUNCH MEAL??

A regular lunch meal is the meal at the regular meal price or can qualify for the free or reduced meal price. It consists of an entree item (including bread and protein), a fruit, a vegetable, and milk. Students must take three of these items; one of which MUST be a fruit or vegetable for the meal to qualify as a "regular meal". If they take less than three components or more than the five, they will be charged the a la carte price for each item regardless of free or reduced status.

Milk-only purchase price is \$0.50. Milk alone is not free or discounted for eligible students.

At the middle school and high school chips, cookies, bottled drinks, etc. are NOT included in the regular lunch meal. These items are available for purchase separately.

### Breakfast @ Lincoln!

If there is a way to be less hurried in the morning, would you take advantage of it? If there is a way to improve your child's grades, would you consider it worthwhile? Breakfast at school could be the answer!

Finding the time to fit a healthy breakfast into your child's daily routine is probably just as difficult as fitting it into your own. Studies show that children who acquire the breakfast habit early are less likely to develop illness, while successful in maintaining a healthy weight, good grades, solid attendance, and overall performance.

Breakfast is available at all buildings within Lincoln's district. The price is \$1.20 and menus can be found at each school or on our website at lincolnk12.org. If your children qualify for free or reduced-priced lunch, they also qualify for free or reduced-priced breakfast!

What Multiage is and isn't... Multiage classrooms are classrooms with students from more than one grade level. They are created because of a pedagogical choice of a school or school district. They are different from split classes which are formed when there are too many students for one class - but not enough to form two classes of the same grade level.

### Some Advantages of Multiage Practices

### The school should fit the child....

Rather than grouping students by grade level, we can group and regroup students based on developmental needs, interests, skills, and learning styles. We value the process of learning and lay the ground work for lifelong learning.

### It is an efficient and effective learning environment....

A multi-year placement encourages friendships, trust, bonding, and a sense of belonging. Knowing a child over time increases a teacher's understanding of that child's needs and how he/she learns best. At the start of a year, the teacher knows a majority of the class, and the students know each other.

### Multiage classrooms promote collaboration. cooperation, self-esteem, and a caring community....

Younger children get a preview of what they will eventually be able to do. Students can work with children who



possess a similar skill level but a different chronological age. There is an opportunity for all children to be both the younger and older members of a peer group. A child can reinforce a newly learned skill by teaching it to someone else. It brings out older children's willingness to help younger ones, and older children accept the responsibility of being role models.

Whenever children are brought into group settings, there is a chance for diseases to spread. Statents must follow state vaccine laws in order to attend school. These laws are the minimum standard to help prevent disease outbreaks in school settings. The best way to pretect statents in your care from other serious diseases is to promote the recommended vaccination schedule at www.cdc.gov/vaccines. Encourage parents to follow CDC's recommended schedule; by doing so, school requirements will be met.

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### PERSONAL CURRICULUM ALTERNATIVE

Generally, to earn a high school diploma, a student must satisfy the requirements of Michigan's Merit Curriculum. The District may modify those requirements, however, by developing a personal curriculum for a student. All students are entitled to a personal curriculum.

A parent or guardian of a student who has completed ninth grade (or the student if at least 18 years old or emancipated), or a student's teacher or counselor, may request a personal curriculum by contacting the High School Principal. A group that includes the student: the student's parent or quardian: and a teacher, guidance counselor, or person acting in a counseling role, will consider the request If the personal curriculum request is made by a student who is at least 18 or who is emancipated, or by a parent or guardian, the group will grant the request and will develop a personal curriculum for the student. For all other requests, the group will develop a personal curriculum if the group determines one is appropriate. For most students, the group that develops the personal curriculum may make only certain modifications to the Merit Curriculum.

For students with disabilities under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and for certain students transferring to the District from a nonpublic school or from out of state, the group may make additional modifications. For all students, a personal curriculum must incorporate as much of the Michigan Merit Curriculum content expectations as is practicable for the student, must include measurable goals for the student to achieve while in high school, must include a method to evaluate whether the student met those goals, and must align with the student's educational development plan.

Before a personal curriculum becomes effective, the High School Principal and the student's parent or guardian (or the student if at least 18 or emancipated) must agree to its terms. Once effective, the student's parent or guardian (or the student if at least 18 or emancipated) must communicate with each of the student's teachers to monitor the student's progress on the personal curriculum goals. A student who successfully satisfies his or her personal curriculum may earn a high school diploma even if the student does not otherwise satisfy all of the Michigan Merit Curriculum requirements.

### FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT FREE AND REDUCED PRICE SCHOOL MEALS

### Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. Lincoln Consolidated Schools offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs \$1.20; lunch costs \$2.55 Elementary and \$2.80 Middle and High School. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced price meals. Reduced price is \$0.30 for breakfast and \$0.40 for lunch. This packet includes an application for free or reduced price meal benefits, and a set of detailed instructions. Below are some common questions and answers to help you with the application process.

### 1. WHO CAN GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS?

- All children in households receiving benefits from Food Assistance Program (FAP), Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR)] or Family Independence Program (FIP), are eligible for free meals.
- Foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals.
- Children participating in their school's Head Start program are eligible for free meals.
- Children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant are eligible for free meals.
- Children may receive free or reduced price meals if your household's income is within the limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines. Your children may qualify for free or reduced price meals if your household income falls at or below the limits on this chart.

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### INTEGRATED PEST MANAGEMENT NOTIFICATION

State of Michigan law requires that schools and day care centers that may apply pesticides on school or day care property must provide an annual advisory to parents or guardians of students attending the facility.

Please note that notification is not given for the use of sanitizers, germicides, disinfectants, or anti-microbial cleaners. In certain emergencies, such as an infestation of stinging insects, pesticides may be applied without prior notice to prevent injury to students, but you will be notified following any such application.

Advance notification of pesticide applications, other than a bait or gel formulation, will be given by at least 48 hours to the application by the following two methods. The first method will be by posting at the main entrance to your school/day care center. The second method will be posting in a public, common area of the school or day care center, other than an entrance. We will post in your school's Main Office.

Please be advised that parents or guardians of children attending the school or day care center are entitled to receive the advance notice of a pesticide application, other than a bait or gel formulation, by first class United States mail postmarked at least 3 days before the pesticide application, if they so requeSt If you prefer to receive the notification by first class mail, please contact your building/program administrator for a form and return it to our office.

### FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT ANNUAL NOTIFICATION OF RIGHTS & DESIGNATION OF DIRECTORY INFORMATION

Each year the Lincoln Consolidated School District is required to give notice of the various rights accorded to parents or students pursuant to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act ("FERPA"). Parents and eligible students have a right to be notified and informed. In accordance with FERPA, you are notified of the following:

- 1. RIGHT TO INSPECT: You have the right to inspect and review substantially all of your education records maintained by or at the Lincoln Consolidated School District. This right extends to the parent of a student under 18 years of age and to any student age 18 or older.
- 2. RIGHT TO REQUEST AMENDMENT: You have the right to seek to have corrected any parts of an education record which you believe to be inaccurate, misleading or otherwise in violation of your rights. This right includes the right to a hearing to present evidence that the record should be changed if a designated official of the Lincoln Consolidated School District decides not to alter the education records according to your requeSt If no change is made to the education record after the hearing, you have a right to place a written rebuttal in the recoRd
- 3. RIGHT TO PREVENT DISCLOSURES: You have the right to prevent disclosure of education records to third parties with certain limited exceptions. It is the intent of the Board of Education to limit the disclosure of information contained in your education records to those instances when prior written consent has been given to the disclosure, as an item of directory information of which you have not refused to permit disclosure, or under the provisions of FERPA which allow disclosure without prior written consent.
- 4. RIGHT TO COMPLAIN: You have the right to file a complaint with the United States Department of Education concerning the alleged failure of the Lincoln Consolidated School District to comply with FERPA. Your complaint should be directed to:

RIGHT TO OBJECT TO RELEASE OF DIRECTORY INFORMATION: Generally, school officials must have written permission from the parent of a student or an eligible student before releasing any information from a student's record However, FERPA allows school districts to disclose, without consent, "directory" type information. You have three weeks from the receipt of this notice to advise the District in writing of any or all of those types of information about the student you refuse to permit the District to designate as directory information. Your objections should be addressed to the respective building principal. Completing this form will provide written notification to the District and this information will not be released without the prior consent of the parent or eligible student.

January and February 2018: "The Glass Menagerie" by Tennessee Williams. Every year, LHS Theatre competes in the MIFA Theatre Festival. The MIFA plays are one-act plays, as they are either cut-down versions of full length plays, or short plays written expressly for one-act festivals. The performances are adjudicated by a panel of judges, with the top shows at the regional level being invited to perform at the state competition. LHS' production of "Hamlet" (2016) and "The Importance of Being Earnest" (2017) were advanced to perform at the state competition, the first shows in our history to earn such an honor. In 2018, we hope to repeat the achievement with "The Glass Menagerie". This script will be adapted by our very own Drew Bos and will be performed at the LHS PAC on February 9. The show will also be performed at the Mid-Michigan Theatre Arts Festival at Garber High School in Essexville, MI on February 2nd. Auditions are in late September with part-time rehearsals starting in October.

**April 2018:** "Curious George" (tentative). Another LHS Theatre annual tradition is a completely student-run production of a children-focused play. It is adapted and directed by LHS student, Ashleigh Wallin, who did the same thing with "The Giving Tree", last season. It is performed at our very own elementary schools as well as neighboring day care and senior citizen centers. More details to come in future Communicator publications.

**May 10-13, 2018:** "The Comedy of Errors" by William Shakespeare is a crazy comedy about two sets of twins who are mistaken for each other. The 2018 season will wrap up with Shakespeare's classic comedy. Auditions will occur in February – exact dates TBD.
