SUPERINTENDENT'S LETTER

It has been a remarkable year of growth for our students and staff. The year began with high expectations and a vision of growth. I am proud to say the students and staff of TEAM Lincoln cleared the bar. I wish to thank the students for their accomplishments, the staff for their dedication, and the families and community members for their support.

In our second year of using NWEA, we observed remarkable growth by our students. The percent of students who met their projected growth in grades first through eighth in Reading and Mathematics increased by 19.19% from the Spring of 2016 to the Winter of 2017. School Conditional Growth Percentile in Reading in grades fifth through eighth was amongst the nation's top five percent ranking 98, 95, 96 and 99.

We have implemented a monthly "Student Recognition" at our Board of Education meetings. This is a celebration of their accomplishment in an area of academics, arts, athletics, clubs, and student leadership. Students are presented a certificate and a lapel pin of the district's logo.

We are so proud of the accomplishments by our students.

On April 24th, a budget proposal was presented to the Board of Education as a first read. The new budget depicts a fund equity balance of \$5,666,994. This equates to 12.98% of our total expenditures, which is up one-percent from January 23, 2017.

Kindergarten/Young 5 Busing

For your child's safety, a parent/guardian or appointed emergency contact person (must be listed on the emergency card and have a picture ID with them) MUST be at the bus stop to pick up your student every day. Please get out of your car or the house when the driver arrives. The driver must be able to see you and recognize the person who is getting their Kindergartner or Young Five student off the bus.

Childcare Arrangement Forms

TRANSPORTATION

What Multiage is and isn't...

Multiage classrooms are classrooms with students from more than one grade level. They are created because of a pedagogical choice of a school or school district. They are different from split classes which are formed when there are too many students for one class - but not enough to form two classes of the same grade level.

Some Advantages of Multiage Practices

The school should fit the child....

Rather than grouping students by grade level, we can group and regroup students based on developmental needs, interests, skills, and learning styles. We value the process of learning and lay the ground work for lifelong learning.

It is an efficient and effective learning environment....

A multi-year placement encourages friendships, trust, bonding, and a sense of belonging. Knowing a child over time increases a teacher's understanding of that child's needs and how he/she learns best. At the start of a year, the teacher knows a majority of the class, and the students know each other.

Multiage classrooms promote collaboration, cooperation, self-esteem, and a caring community....

Younger children get a preview of what they will eventually be able to do. Students can work with children who

possess a similar skill level but a different chronological age. There is an opportunity for all children to be both the younger and older members of a peer group. A child can reinforce a newly learned skill by teaching it to someone else. It brings out older children's willingness to help younger ones, and older children accept the responsibility of being role models.



ACTIVE LEARNING AT BISHOP ELEMENTARY

At Bishop Elementary, we incorporate HighScope's Elementary Learning Design. One of the key ingredients is ACTIVE LEARNING. What does this mean for our students?

- Engagement with materials, actions and events, and/or ideas.
- Opportunities to make their own choices and decisions, when appropriate.
- Communication with others (gestural, spoken, and written).
- Support from the teacher, other adults, and peers.

Another key ingredient is THE ENVIRONMENT. What do our classrooms look like?

- · Classrooms are arranged by subject area or interest.
- Materials and other relevant tools and resources are easily accessible and well organized.
- There are spaces for the whole group to gather, and areas for small groups and individuals to work.
- The classroom and school climate is warm, respectful, fun, and welcoming.
- Student work is visible.

Children learn best when they follow a consistent DAILY SCHEDULE. What does this include?

- Whole group, interactive learning in all subject areas
- Small group workshops
- · Teaming with other teachers and classrooms
- Student initiated projects (We call this PDR or Plan, Do, Review).

LINCOLN EARLY CHILDHOOD SERVICES

The Lincoln Early Childhood Center, located in Model Elementary School, offers a range of comprehensive services for children from birth through age five. The center utilizes a model that emphasizes that parents are a child's first, best, and most influential teachers.

The Early Childhood Center includes classrooms for Great Start Readiness Program, Early Childhood Special Education, and Lincoln's Early On Program. The goal of the center is to establish a primary prevention community available to families living in the Lincoln community. Through strong parental involvement, the Early Childhood Center is an avenue promoting the improved social, cognitive, and physical growth of young children in our community.

Pre-School

Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP) is a grant-funded preschool program. Students must be four years old by September 1st and reside in the Washtenaw ISD. Eligibility for this program is based on household income and a child's "risk factors." For more information on this program please call 484-7070.

Lincoln also offers a tuition-based pre-school run by Bemis Farms, and located at Model Elementary. Students must be three years old by September 1st. For more information on this program please call 734-678-7778.

If you have any concerns about your child's development, the staff at the Lincoln Early Childhood Center at Model Elementary is ready to work with you. We can provide free developmental screenings. When screening results indicate a need for more in-depth information, we can provide evaluation services to determine if a child/family is eligible to receive the following services that our center provides:

- Occupational Therapy
- Physical Therapy

FREE & REDUCED LUNCH

FOR QUICKER SERVICE, APPLICATIONS CAN BE COMPLETED ONLINE!

Free and reduced-price meals are available to qualified families. Eligibility is based on family income and size. If you think you may qualify, please fill out **one application per family** and return to any school office, or mail to Lincoln Consolidated Schools, 8970 Whittaker Road, Ypsilanti, MI 48197. Applications are also available on our website at www.lincolnK12.org. Applications will be accepted at any school building, but please mark **Food Service** on the envelope to ensure prompt delivery.

If you received benefits at another school district, you will not be eligible for free or reduced meals at Lincoln Schools until an application has been processed and approved. You may apply for free and reduced-priced meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a later change such as a decrease in household income or an increase in household size, you may complete an application at that time.

New applications must be completed every school year. You are responsible to purchase meals or send a lunch until your application is approved.

WHAT IS A REGULAR LUNCH MEAL??

A regular lunch meal is the meal at the regular meal price or can qualify for the free or reduced meal price. It consists of an entree item (including bread and protein), a fruit, a vegetable, and milk. Students must take three of these items; one of which MUST be a fruit or vegetable for the meal to qualify as a "regular meal". If they take less than three components or more than the five, they will be charged the a la carte price for each item regardless of free or reduced status.

Milk-only purchase price is \$0.75. Milk alone is not free or discounted for eligible students.

At the middle school and high school chips, cookies, bottled drinks, etc. are NOT included in the regular lunch meal. These items are available for purchase separately.

Breakfast @ Lincoln!

If there is a way to be less hurried in the morning, would you take advantage of it? If there is a way to improve your child's grades, would you consider it worthwhile? Breakfast at school could be the answer!

Finding the time to fit a healthy breakfast into your child's daily routine is probably just as difficult as fitting it into your own. Studies show that children who acquire the breakfast habit early are less likely to develop illness, while successful in maintaining a healthy weight, good grades, solid attendance, and overall performance.

Breakfast is available at all buildings within Lincoln's district. The price is \$1.20 and menus can be found at each school or on our website at lincolnk12.org. If your children qualify for free or reduced-priced lunch, they also qualify for free or reduced-priced breakfast!

STAYING HEALTHLY IN THE SUMMER TIME



Spring and summer are here and so to is the risk for Lyme disease. Lyme disease is an illness caused by a germ that comes from a type of insect called a tick that can make you feel like you have the flu (e.g., fever, tiredness, aches and pains, headaches). It can also cause a rash or problems with your joints, nerves, and heart. Some people develop a "bull's eye" rash at the site they were bitten. If you are bitten by a certain type of ticks, it's possible to contract the disease.

Since ticks are found in tall grasses and wooded areas it's important that you take steps to protect yourself while outdoors including:

- Covering exposed areas with shoes, long-sleeved shirts, long pants. You might also tuck your pants into your socks.
- Use a bug spray containing no more than 30% DEET
- Check your body and clothes for ticks after being outdoors.

If you find a tick on your body or on your child, use tweezers to grab it as close to the head as possible pulling slowly and gently. Afterward, wash the area with soap and water. If you think you have been bitten by a tick or if you develop symptoms such as rash, body aches, of fatigue after a tick bite see your health care provider.





FAIRY TALES IN LITERATURE

known individual with autism to play college basketball. During his time on the team he played in two Big Ten Championships and a Final Four.



LINCOLN HIGH SCHOOL CHOIRS



Students work on Lego WeDo robotics in the Brick afterschool STEM program.




BISHOP STUDENTS REUSE, REDUCE, AND RECYCLE!





LINCOLN HIGH SCHOOL THEATRE DEPARTMENT PRESENTS: A TALE OF TWO CITIES
