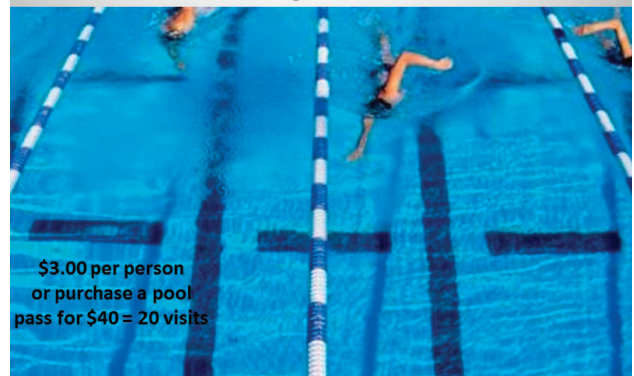

LINCOLN EARLY CHILDHOOD SERVICES

The Lincoln Early Childhood Center, located in Model Elementary School, offers a range of comprehensive services for children from birth through age five. The center utilizes a model that emphasizes that parents are a child's first, best, and most influential teachers.

The Early Childhood Center includes classrooms for the Great Start Readiness Program, Early Childhood Special Education, and Lincoln's Early On Program. The goal of the center is to establish a primary prevention community available to families living in the Lincoln community. Through strong parental involvement, the Early Childhood Center is an avenue promoting the improved social, cognitive, and physical growth of young children in our community.

Pre-School

Lincoln offers two different pre-school programs. Students for these programs must be three years old by September 1st and reside in the Lincoln School District. Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP) is a grant-funded pre-school program. Eligibility for this program is based on household income and a child's "risk factors." For more information on this program please call 484-7070.

Lincoln also offers a tuition-based pre-school run by Bemis Farms, and is located at Model Elementary. For more information on this program please call 734-678-7778.

ATTENTION: PARENTS OF CHILDREN BIRTH – AGE FIVE

If you have any concerns about your child's development, the staff at the Lincoln Early Childhood Center at Model Elementary is ready to work with you. We can provide free developmental screenings. When screening results indicate a need for more in-depth information, we can provide evaluation services to determine if a child/family is eligible to receive the following services that our center provides:

- Social Work Services
- Services of School Psychologist
- Speech and Language Services
- Occupational Therapy
- Physical Therapy

FREE & REDUCED LUNCH

FOR QUICKER SERVICE, APPLICATIONS CAN BE COMPLETED ONLINE!

Free and reduced-price meals are available to qualified families. Eligibility is based on family income and size. If you think you may qualify, please fill out **one application per family** and return to any school office, or mail to Lincoln Consolidated Schools, 7425 Willis Road, Ypsilanti, MI 48197. Applications are also available online at fs.lincolnk12.mi.us. Applications will be accepted at any school building, but please mark **Food Service** on the envelope to ensure prompt delivery.

If you received benefits at another school district, you will not be eligible for free or reduced meals at Lincoln Schools until an application has been processed and approved. You may apply for free and reduced-priced meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a later change such as a decrease in household income or an increase in household size, you may complete an application at that time.

New applications must be completed every school year. You are responsible to purchase meals or send a lunch until your application is approved.

RAHS HEALTH CORNER NEWS

Influenza is a highly infectious (easily spread) viral illness, and is commonly called "the flu". Flu viruses infect the respiratory tract and can cause a more severe illness.

Viruses that cause the flu are spread by direct contact with respiratory droplets usually from someone coughing or sneezing. Symptoms usually appear within 1-4 days after being infected and include:

- Fever
- Cough
- Sore throat
- Runny or stuffy nose
- Body and muscle aches
- Headache
- Extreme fatigue
- Sometimes vomiting and diarrhea

Most people recover from the flu completely in 1 to 2 weeks, but some people may develop serious complications such as pneumonia.

To prevent the flu:

- Wash your hands frequently, especially after coughing, sneezing, or blowing your nose and after being around someone who is sick.
- Give your immune system a boost by eating healthy foods, getting regular physical activity and plenty of rest

Get the Flu Vaccine

- A dose of flu vaccine is recommended for everyone 6 months and older, every year, each flu season.
- The flu shot cannot cause the flu. There are many flu viruses, and they are always changing.

Flu vaccine cannot prevent:

Flu that is caused by a virus not covered by the vaccine, or illnesses that look like flu but are not. It takes about 2 weeks for protection to develop after vaccination, and protection lasts through the flu season.

Flu vaccines are available now. Remember It is not too late to vaccinate!

In many cases appointments for vaccines are available at RAHS the same day for anyone 21 or younger. Please contact the RAHS clinic or your Primary Care Provider to schedule your vaccine today. PARENT ENGAGEMENT: A LOOK AT WHY I CHOOSE TO VOLUNTEER

I am a proud parent of a second grader at Bishop Elementary. I love talking to my son about his day and what he did that made his day. As parents, we ask him daily, "What was the best thing about your day? What was the thing you didn't like?" His answers vary daily, but he never has to think too hard regardless. My son loves the school, his teachers and his many friends. It became apparent to me, early on, that, as parents, we needed to be involved so that we could continue to support his enthusiasm. As an author and stay-at-home parent, I am able to commit weekly to assist the classes, while my wife volunteers for chaperone duty on field trips. Not everyone has the flexibility to do this, so I consider myself fortunate.

I started volunteering with my son's class during his kindergarten year. I enjoyed working with the classrooms over the years. I have copied papers, helped the children with their classwork and aided them to prepare crafts that they would display proudly. At times, I think I have had more fun than they did. To be completely honest, I love walking into the school and feeling the excitement from the students as they head to one of their specials classes, to the cafeteria or as they leave for the day. Their unbridled enthusiasm for life in general is something that, as an adult, has started to wane once you enter the working world. In a time where you see memes and gifs about "The Monday Blues" on a weekly basis, you can easily miss the fact that some people are still excited about getting back to their weekly routine and sharing their adventures about what transpired over the past weekend.

As a parent, I also enjoy the fact that I do get to enjoy more interaction with the teachers and staff that some do not have the opportunity of enjoying. I have watched as the school has made strides in their attempt to improve communication with the parents and community. As part of that process, specifically the School Improvement board, I appreciate the fact that I can come and give my thoughts and suggestions and they do not fall on deaf ears. The same is true with B.R.A.V.O., where we, as parents, have an opportunity to directly affect the extracurricular activities that help to make Bishop a great environment for the students and their parents.

I also gained an even greater appreciation for the teachers and paraprofessionals that work with the students on a daily basis. Where I come in for a few hours a week, these teachers are here daily, and not once have I heard any of them complain or offer negative opinions of the school, staff, or students. This staff, from my perspective, enjoy what they do, and I can appreciate the fact that my son spends a good part of his day with someone who cares about him as a person, and not a means to an end.

At the end of the day, I get personal enjoyment from working with the kids, and I enjoy helping out where I can. As I try to teach my sons about responsibility, respect and serving others, I want to ensure that I'm not just telling them, but I'm showing them too. The fact-of-the-matter is, it leaves a longer lasting impression on them if they see me doing the act, rather than just hearing it from me. BISHOP STAFF LEAD THE WAY

The staff at Bishop Elementary welcome students and their families each day. They work to create a positive, enriching learning environment to meet the needs of the whole child. Bishop Elementary houses the Multiage Program and the Spanish Immersion program that provides alternative learning environments for a student's education. These programs are lead by creative new and veteran teachers who work together in various committees to build our school community through projects.

In collaboration with our BRAVO parent group, we provide opportunities such as Green Schools Initiative, Literacy Nights, Science Nights, Class Gardens, Bishop Blog, and the Spain Cultural Exchange Program. Our teachers provide learning opportunities through project based learning activities, field trips, to enhance the Lincoln Consolidated School District curriculum. Bishop provides a team of educators, under the guidance of Principal Robert Jansen, to support students that consists of general education teachers, at-risk and special education teachers, ancillary support staff, specials teachers, secretaries and para-professionals. Our teachers' model being lifelong learners by participating in professional reading groups and professional development at school. Teachers attend workshops and seminars to improve their skills with the 10 Essentials of Literacy, Project Based Learning, and Restorative Justice that supports socio-emotional well being. Working together, they make Bishop Elementary a great place to learn and grow!

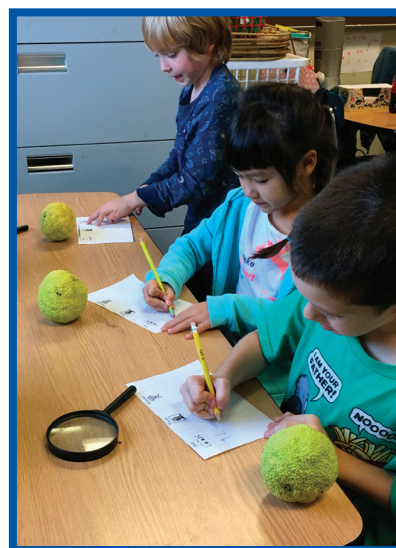


BISHOP BOOK BUDDIES

Ms. Adamski's class played a silent trading game to grasp what it might have been like to trade goods between Native Americans and Europeans.

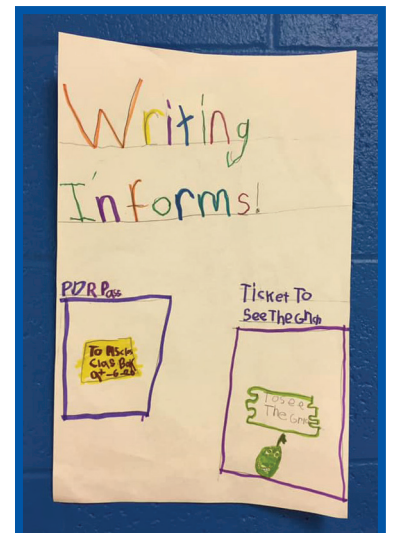


BISHOP BREAKFAST WITH SANTA

Peer-to-Peer support students are there to participate in the activities scheduled during lunch, and be models for students with needs throughout the school day. The Peer-to-Peer support students are under the direction of special education staff members such as the Teacher Consultant, Social Worker, Occupational Therapist, Speech and Language Therapist, and School Psychologist.

Peer-to-Peer support students are selected on a voluntary basis from the classroom at Bishop Elementary School. Peer-to-Peer support students have parent and teacher permission to participate in the program.

CHILDS ELEMENTARY YOUNG FIVES KINDERGARTEN

Students who have not turned five by the first day of the 2019-20 school year have the opportunity to enroll in the Young Fives Kindergarten program. This program, which is the first year of a two year kindergarten experience, is an activity-based learning classroom to introduce reading, writing and math readiness skills. Students are actively engaged and moving while learning these skills and applying them appropriately, AND having fun at the same time. They become experienced and confident in their abilities to enter the traditional kindergarten next year.

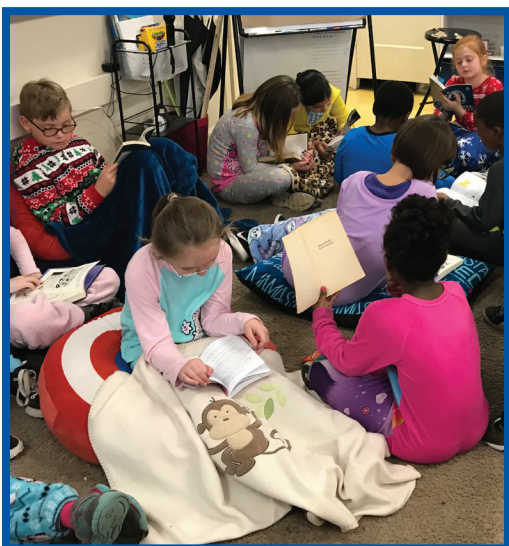
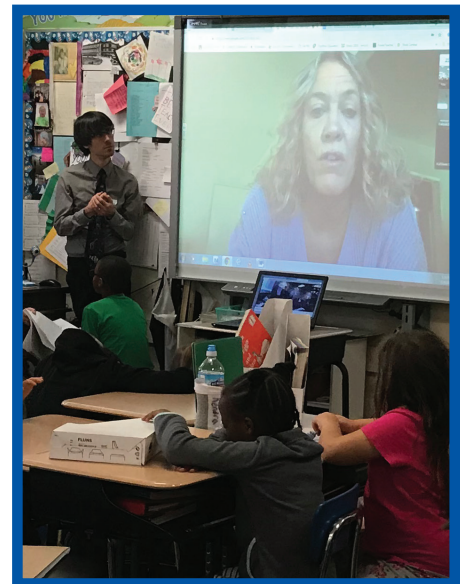


ROSIE REVERE, ENGINEER & FRIENDS

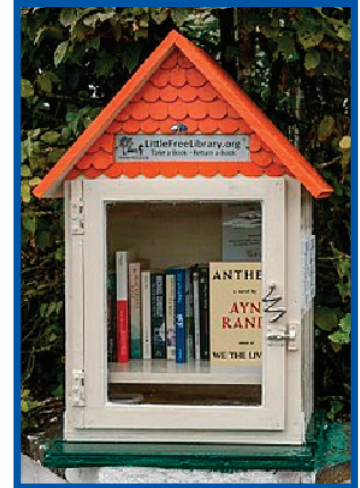

NHS INDUCTS NEW CLASS

WHAT IS PDR?

At Bishop Elementary, we follow the High Scope model. The High Scope curriculum focuses on intrinsic motivation in each child. Within High Scope comes PDR or Plan-Do-Review. The PDR model allows every child to participate in a personal or group activity/project that is both purposeful and relevant to their own interests.

While projects in each grade may look different, all provide the opportunity for children to apply concepts within their control, competence and success. Students take the time to plan their project-it may take a day or week. Students tell teachers their plan and what materials they will need to be successful and begin working.

During “Do” time, they are able to freely work by themselves or with classmates to complete their project. Students’ activities may vary within building, art, dramatic play, writing, or math; all allowing students to construct their social and emotional skills with peers. At the end of each block, students review. Typically they look back at their plan and their do time and share what happened and what they have created. Review time is not only important for students to take ownership of their project, but this allows other students to gain ideas from their peers by listening and seeing what was created.

BISHOP EXCHANGE PROGRAM

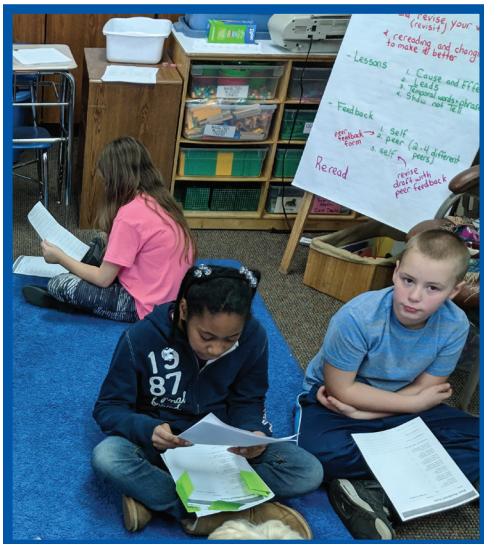
This year, a new group of fifth grade students are participating in the Bishop Exchange Program. These students, supported by MAIZ Mexican Cantina in Ypsilanti along with other generous donors, will leave on March 21st to spend two and a half weeks in Madrid, Spain with a Spanish fifth grader and his or her family. In April, those Spanish students will come to Ypsilanti and be hosted by the Bishop students for three weeks. Both American and Spanish students will be fully immersed in a different culture, learning about the food, art, schools, sports, and many deeper cultural issues that must be experienced to understand. Last year, in an address to the entire school, one of the Spanish exchange students said, "Our experience here it's fantastic!!! And it looks like the movies. We love your country and your traditions, but the best are the families, they look after us all the time. Only we can say one word: Thank you!"



Last year the exchange program benefited far more than just the 10 traveling students. All Bishop students had the opportunity to interact with the Spanish students and consider what the finest aspects of Ypsilanti and Lincoln are to show off to our new friends. The success of the program is evident by the larger size of the participating group this year. Parents, staff and students all appreciated the importance of experiencing a different culture in educating well-rounded students. Last years' travelers started middle school this year bolstered by the confidence gained through this program.

With them in the elevator was newly elected representative Karen Whitsett who now represents parts of Dearborn and Detroit.

Students were able to visit the office of their state representatives and to meet state representative Ronnie Peterson and state senator Rebekah Warren. A tour of the Capitol building was provided to the students. They also spoke with MEA lobbyist Dr. David Michelson about his role as a lobbyist, which is a position that students will be learning about in AP U.S. Government during second semester. Brenda Ortega from MEA Voice joined students on this trip and wrote an article titled "Empowering the Next Generation" which went out in the online MEA Voice to MEA members across the state of Michigan on December 12th.
